Roanoke Rapids Em-ployment Service/Job-Link Manager Tommy McKnight said a part-marship between the nership between the Department of Labor Department of Labor and the Department of Veteran Affairs is launching the Veterans Retraining Assistance Program to provide up to 12 months of training assistance in a VA-ap-proved community col-lege or technical school program that leads to an associate's uested or industry-recognized certificate for veterans
