


WHERE ARE THEY NOW?

Todd Arthur (UNC B.S., 1989, D.D.S., 1993) provides a narrative that reminds me a lot of my own. He grew up in Roanoke Rapids, the youngest member of a family that included no college graduates and limited means of furthering his own education beyond RRHS. What he did gain from that family was a sense of how hard they had to work to make ends meet and provide for the basic everyday needs of their offspring. So Todd, early on, was determined to find some means of setting himself on a path that included higher education.

He says that he "knew there were loans available that I could apply for that would allow me to get an education," which was also my original plan, and of course nowadays, that idea probably figures into the majority of

undergraduates' planning at one time or another. Todd relates that he "did not know anything about the [Alston-Pleasants] scholarship," so he Todd Arthur '89 & his wife Wendy was "very surprised to learn that I was selected" for that prize. (If this

sounds familiar, it's because Diane Kuehn, the A-P scholar we saluted in the last newsletter, didn't know she had won that scholarship either, until she showed up on campus to start her freshman year.)

Thus did the A-P help Todd realize "that my dreams of a college degree were becoming more attainable."

Todd went on to earn his B. S. in biology, having considered for quite a while that he wanted a career as some kind of health care professional. After looking at all his options, he settled on dentistry, "mainly because of the convenient hours and the opportunity to own a business."

He would beg to differ with Thomas Wolfe's assertion that "you can't go home again." Todd came back to Roanoke Rapids right after finishing dental school to partner with a colleague, with whom he has practiced for 20 years. Together, they have funded three annual scholarships for the dental hygiene program via Halifax Community College. The way he sees it, "It is in this way that I feel as though I have been able to give back some of what I have been blessed with through the Alston-Pleasants Scholarship."

Todd always knew that he wanted to go to Carolina, because the entire family rooted for the Heels' football and basketball teams, and now his daughter is in her freshman year at UNC. He and wife Wendy also have a son who is a junior in high school and already looking to add to the family's Carolina degrees, and of course give Mom and Dad ample cause to get back to the Hill on a frequent basis.

Hearing his story, knowing what he's done with the opportunity provided by the Alston-Pleasants scholarship, how he's now "passing it on" to help others get more education, has to cheer all of us who can claim him as an A-P kinsman.
